Within the space of one month, we have seen the announcements of 3 lockdowns. While this was expected and understood that it is for the greater good, we are experiencing a spectrum of thoughts and emotions. Our first thought was to reach out to underprivileged women in the city as well as our support staff. We supplied 11400 sanitary napkins during this difficult time. This stock had been created by our own students and the women from the unit we have established in Jargah. We also distributed rations among our support staff and regularly supplied food and rations to the colony of migrant labour, who camp outside our school. It is a time for reaching out. And reach out we did. This time we asked our alumni to tell us how they are spending time in the lockdown. We were delighted to get responses, especially from teachers and students of the first batch of our school!

I hope, seeing so many Old Girls featured in this issue of the SKV newsletter, many connections will be revived and new ones will be made. Sankalp Sanitary Napkin Distribution

While most of us are primarily concerned about receiving a sufficient quantity of rations, many underprivileged women are troubled by the unavailability and cost of other essential items.

To help these women live through the lockdown period without compromising their dignity, SKV provided 11,400 Sankalp Sanitary Napkins to the Department of Food & Civil Supplies, Gwalior, to support underprivileged women who have lost their livelihoods during lockdown and, therefore, cannot access this essential hygiene product.

In such trying times, the most impacted are those on the periphery of our social sphere, the itinerant labourers and the daily wage earners. She is perusing her hobbies to keep herself occupied during this period of lockdown. Staying at home has been her way of doing her part to prevent the spread of the virus.






She is trying her best to stay at home and help street dogs and cows and poor people in this lockdown.

Online Activity Classes Report

In the wake of ongoing COVID-19 pandemic, to keep the learning wheel moving for students, Performing and Visual Arts department started with Online Activity classes from 8th April. Each student was asked to choose two activities from the categories of Western Instrument, Painting, Indian Instrument (Tabla), Bharatnatyam and Western Vocal. Based on their choices, students were divided in to Basic and Advanced groups.

Teachers conducted Live classes via multiple online modes to impart lessons. Students showed great enthusiasm in learning each activity and were proactive in sharing their learnings with their teachers via videos. Let's explore teachings of each activity:

Painting: Creative thinking inspired ideas

When teaching online, one has to be mindful of what material to use during a lockdown. To keep students creatively involved, painting on newspapers, drawing and shading activities were included. They learnt to draw freehand lines and shapes to make beautiful designs, to sketch faces, make perspective drawing and monoprints. To decorate their houses, they learnt to make Wall Décor paintings from newspaper. The students had a positive response, sharing a few pieces of art that was made by them.

Dance: Utilizing tradition as a form of expression

Dance is a medium to express one's feelings and emotions. To utilize the medium, students of the basic group, were taught the Bharatnatyam terms, the Namaskaram tradition in classical dance style, Armandi and its importance, and Hastamudra. In the advance group, both the groups could understand the Bhakti Bhava and different Angbhangima of particular terms. Kathak girls could understand the 'Chakradhar' and the importance of 'Sam' in Kathak. Bharatnatyam girls could learn Kartari Adavu and Dhitta Adavu. Online Parent Teacher Meeting Report

Scindia Kanya Vidyalaya held its first ever online Parent Teacher Meeting from the 20th to the 25th of April. After five weeks of online classes, it was necessary for subject teachers to connect with the parents and students. The Parent Teacher Meeting helped the parents to understand the work done, information about assignments completed, etc.

Students received the Holiday Homework for all subjects and parents were able to share valuable feedback with the subject teachers as well. Like online classes, this too was a learning experience for both the faculty members and parents. Valuable feedback received from the parents through the feedback forms will help the school to fine tune the online classes and make the learning process more interactive and effective. Keeping the interest of the students as a priority, we, at SKV, constantly endeavour to provide the best possible solutions to our students.

In June, we plan to take online classes to a new level. Live classes will be held for all classes on Microsoft Teams. These classes will follow a set time table and reduce the amount of screen time for students, thus giving them time to pursue other interests and hobbies and also have time for self- study.

Scindia Kanya Vidyalaya is one of the showcase Schools of Microsoft and we have

the campus license for all our faculty members as well as students. Microsoft Teams is a secure and safe platform for teaching and learning, as only authorized users can enter the platform. Within Teams, teachers can create a classroom. channels (for different topics or chapters), upload videos and URL links, all in addition to conducting live meetings at scheduled times. Teachers can quickly converse with students, share files and websites, create a OneNote Class Notebook, and distribute and grade assignments. Built-in OneNote Class Notebooks and end-to-end assignment management allows teachers to organize interactive lessons and provide effective and timely feedback. Teachers can also use the whiteboard facility to write on the board during the live class. These classes can be recorded, so they can be viewed by the student later as well.

The past five weeks of online classes have ensured that the learning process remained uninterrupted. Our students' wellbeing remains our primary concern. The faculty members will continue to acquire new skills to ensure that learning remains a joyful and interesting experience for all.

Though there can be nothing better than having our students back with us, Live classes will enable all students and teachers to interact with each other regularly, till we meet again.



National Talent Search Examination
Despite the compulsory closure, SKV has
endeavoured to provide regular student
support with SAT-NTSE coaching being
provided for our Class 10 students on
Google classroom in science, maths and
the social sciences.

The current Class 10 receive material to work with independently, along with individual help and audio-visual learning aids. These classes will continue during the summer break, with the school adding to the number with selected Class 9 students. Regular SAT-NTSE classes will restart when school reopens.





Live classes with Microsoft Teams

After a short summer break, SKV will move into the second phase of online teaching, with the commencement of "live" online classes in June. A few of the senior students have already participated in live classes in selected subjects, but in June, the entire school will be included for all disciplines. The school has decided on using Microsoft Teams as the chosen platform for these classes; it has already been tried and tested in the senior groups.

It is an occasion to be proud, as Scindia Kanya Vidyalaya is one of the showcase schools of Microsoft in India to be granted a campus license to use "Teams" for the entire faculty members and student community. Only authorized users can utilize this software, which is encrypted and therefore a safe platform for teaching and learning to take place.

Every student and teacher has been given an account on Microsoft Teams on the Microsoft office 365 portal. As mentioned earlier, Class 12 subject teachers have already commenced using this software to deliver live lectures in April. Come June, SKV would have the entire school transitioning smoothly to virtual classes.

Using "Team", teachers can create an appropriate classroom environment and can upload videos on various channels (for different topics or chapters) and send students URL links for study material, as well as conduct live meetings that simulate actual classes at scheduled times.

Teachers can easily interact with students, share files and websites, create a OneNote Class Notebook, and distribute and grade assignments. With the facility to construct OneNote Class Notebooks and end-to-end assignment management, teachers have

the ability to effectively organize interactive lessons and provide students with timely feedback

Teacher can also use the virtual whiteboard included on the platform to write on during teaching, just like in an actual classroom. These classes can be recorded, enabling students to view them repeatedly at home. These recordings can become part of the instructional resources of the school. Attendance to these classes are recorded and an Excel sheet of the class record can be downloaded and printed out.

What is particularly interesting is a feature that is being incorporated, that provides a touch of realism in the virtual setting. This is the "raise your hand" feature, where the student can raise a hand and interact with the teacher in real time. This truly transforms the setting into an actual classroom, even with the students at home.

SKV is looking forward to using technology to its advantage in providing uninterrupted education to its students. It is undoubtedly a learning curve, but, in the end, only goes to prove that both students and teachers are intricately involved with each other in the field of education.



Beating the Quarantine with Quarazine



The nation-wide lockdown has brought an abrupt pause to our children's school life. However, the sudden transition to online learning has not addressed the immediate loss of interaction that is felt from reconnecting digitally. Our students feel disconnected from their school, and we
